We are in the midst of a period of great importance. God's simple yet far-reaching vision for First Church is being brought into sharp focus. This vision has not changed since 1635.

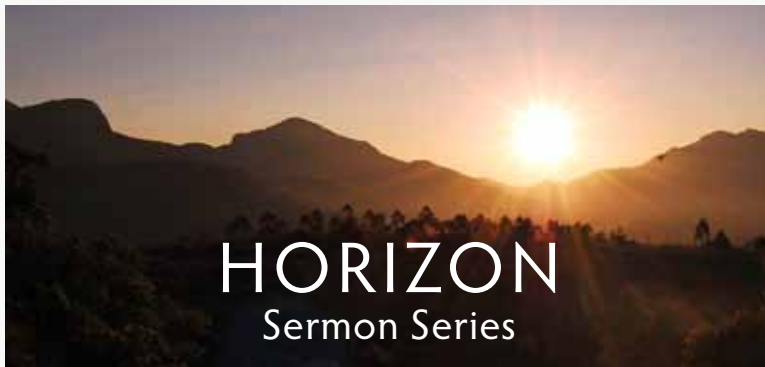
Our vision statement is: *Foster a grassroots movement of Kingdom communities who love God and love others in*

ONE OF MY MENTORS asked me the other day, "What could hold you back from moving the vision forward?" He was simply asking me this: *Are there things in your life or in your church that could block the vision from moving forward?*

To be honest, I have been struggling with these questions for a few years. God has impressed upon me a number of times His vision for me and First Church. I have written it down and even gotten excited about it. Unfortunately, I then concluded, it's too big, it's too big for me.

I have struggled like Moses when God revealed to him His desire to save His people in Egypt. Moses was excited about what God wanted to do. He was not excited about God's desire to use him.

Moses, we know, came up with every excuse as to why God should choose someone else. Moses argued that no one would believe him. He then said he couldn't speak eloquently. Finally, he asked if God could send someone else.

I have given all of those excuses to God. I have argued. I have tried to run away. God has answered every excuse and has revealed His power to fulfill what He desires.

I believe this vision is from God. I believe His desire is for us to *foster a grassroots movement of Kingdom communities who love God and love others in profound ways and live to extend His Kingdom.*

If we believe this vision, then we need to make sure we do everything to move forward with it. We must ask ourselves the question I was asked. Is there anything that could block the vision from moving forward?

If you believe with me that this vision is God's desire for us, then we must do everything to bring it about.

Living Out God's Vision

OUR HIGH SCHOOL YOUTH have been going over to Hartford City Mission to tutor inner-city youth. These senior-highers have been transformed through their serving. They have built relationships, shared Scripture, and impacted those they are serving.

As I think about our vision and how we live it out, this example of serving the outside community is helpful. Our youth are providing a model that shows how serving others can help us not only *be* disciples but also *make* disciples.

Serving others helps us grow as disciples.

One of the first things Jesus did with His disciples was to send them out. He didn't wait for them to graduate first. He sent out the twelve disciples in Luke 9, and in Luke 10 He sent out the seventy-two. Jesus knew that we grow as disciples when we are out working in the field. We don't learn to ride a bike by reading a book or watching a video. We learn to ride by getting on the bike and doing it with someone's help. In the same way, we learn to *be* His disciples by *acting* as His disciples.

With this knowledge, we are to go out and serve all over the world. Mission trips to the Dominican Republic and Peru are great because they help us grow as disciples. In the mission field we learn to trust God for His provision. We learn what it means to partner with Him and do His work.

Of course, we don't always have to travel long distances in our mission work. There are great needs around us. Last summer the Deacons served together (*top photo*). Learning to walk with God into these places of need is vital for our growth as disciples.

Let's face it, there are some things that can be learned only through serving others.

Serving others helps us extend His Kingdom.

Obviously, we don't just go out because we want to grow. We go out because we want to extend His Kingdom as well. God is already at work around us. When we serve others, we are partnering with Him to do His work. Addressing the needs around us gives us wonderful opportunities to love and serve people. It allows us to show our love for Jesus—and for them—by our actions. Sometimes, God gives us occasions to share His story through not only action but words as well. Furthermore, through our actions, we get to show others what God's Kingdom *looks* like.

Growing as disciples also happens at church.

Serving others is important to our growth as disciples. Obviously, it is not the only way to grow. Vital growth happens in the building as well. Corporately, we worship our amazing God in church. We also can learn more about God through classes and interaction with others. We can serve and love others who are part of our congregation. Disciples grow both inside and outside the church.

The Marsh Building

Some have been wondering how the upcoming Marsh Building renovation fits in with our vision. This project enables us to fulfill our vision because we use that building to grow disciples. The Marsh Building is where we raise our children to be disciples. It is one of the essential places we gather for weekday meetings to go deeper with God and one another. And it is the place where a significant portion of our people worship God. The Marsh Building is vital to our disciple-making mission.

The Marsh building is in desperate need of repair. The walls downstairs where the children learn are showing an even deeper problem. For one thing, there are issues with drainage around the foundation. This problem is not going away unless we fix it. I shudder when I see a new family going down there. Will they leave because they believe we are not creating a healthy environment for our children?

We are trying to be a community that lovingly provides a haven of hope. All of our buildings should be welcoming—especially where our children are.

Begin the conversation with others.

God's vision for us involves other churches!

Many of you know Christians who go to other churches. As you connect with them, *share the vision*. Think

through ways you can partner together to extend His Kingdom. Pray together. Show off God's great love together.

I believe God wants to do great things in our midst, and I believe He wants us to do it together with others.

Peru Trip Nears!

It's been a year since we first began our partnership with Temple Zion Church in Barranca, Peru, both directly and through Compassion International. As a congregation, we continue to develop bonds with the church and its pastor and parishioners—learning from each other and sponsoring children who attend Temple Zion's after-school program.

From May 15 to 22, seven from our church will travel to Barranca to build upon this partnership and some of the relationships already begun through correspondence with (and support of) individual children.

Here is how the rest of us can participate in this trip, from home:

SPONSOR A CHILD

If you are not currently a sponsor, visit the sponsorship table in the Wells Area on **any Sunday through May 13**, where you can

choose a specific child to sponsor and receive a photo/information packet.

HAVE US TAKE A GIFT FOR YOUR CHILD

If you currently sponsor a child, you can provide a small gift, which will be presented to your child. The item should be able to fit into a 1-quart Ziploc bag and must be clearly labeled with the child's name and Compassion Child ID number. They can be dropped off at the church **through May 6**.

- **Pray that the team will be open to God's leading and sensitive to the work the Lord is doing, and how we as a church can further support this work.**
- **Pray that our team will discern ways that Temple Zion's own Kingdom work can serve as a model for First Church.**
